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## Reciprocity for Local General Education Requirements

The College shall apply courses taken at other U.S. regionally accredited colleges or universities toward Oxnard College's general education (GE) requirements in:

- 1.) the areas where the student would have received credit at the institution where they were originally taken, or
- 2.) in the area where the college granting the degree places the course, or
- 3.) where the course meets OC's GE criteria/ description, or
- 4.) where OC would place a comparable course.

The course will be applied in whichever area best facilitates the student's degree completion.

## Double Counting for a Credit Course

While a course might satisfy more than one general education requirement, it may not be counted more than once for these purposes within sections A through D of the district general education pattern(s). A course may not satisfy more than one requirement within a major and/or area of emphasis. However, a course may be used to satisfy both a general education requirement and a major or area of emphasis requirement. A course may also be used to satisfy requirements in two (2) or more different majors, whether for an Associate degree, Associate degree for Transfer, Certificate of Achievement, or Proficiency Award. The units, however, may never be counted more than once toward the units required for the specific degree, certificate or proficiency award

## Credit for AP/IB/CLEP

Students may receive credit toward OC GE in accordance with the VCCCD Credit by Exam policy and course and area equivalencies as listed in the current college catalog. Students must provide official test scores to have their credit evaluated by an OC Counselor. Students granted credit for AP, IB, or CLEP examinations shall not earn credit toward an associate degree for duplicated college courses.

## The Oxnard College General Education Plan is for Associate in Arts and Associate in Science in Specific Majors or the Associate in Arts in General Studies, Pattern 1.

Requirements to Earn an Associate Degree (A.A. or A.S.)

1. Complete Oxnard College's General Education Requirements. Students completing an AA/AS in a specific major will complete areas A-E. Students completing the AA in General Studies, Pattern I will need to complete areas A-F.
2. Choose a major and complete all required courses in that major with a grade of "C" or better or "P." Even though a "Pass" is allowed, it is recommended that students complete all major coursework for a letter grade (A, B, or C).
3. Complete a total of 60 semester units of degree-applicable college credit coursework.
4. Demonstrate **competency** in reading, written expression, and mathematics as defined in Title 5 section 55063 for the appropriate catalog year.
5. Achieve a cumulative grade point average of no less than 2.0 in degree-applicable college credit coursework.
6. Complete a minimum of 12 semester units in residence at Oxnard College.
7. Apply for the Associate Degree in the Counseling Office by the published deadline dates. All official transcripts and test scores (AP, IB, CLEP) must be on file with the Admissions and Records office.
