STUDENT SUCCESS COMMITTEE

Authority

The Committee is recommended by staff and approved by the President. The Committee is appointed by and is a participatory governance committee to the President and the Academic Senate of Oxnard College.

Purnose

The purpose of the Student Success Committee is to develop, implement and assess a model that examines data for the evaluation of student success and advise appropriate shared governance bodies related to the charge of the committee and its findings. The data elements will provide a foundation for examining effectiveness and will serve to frame recommendations. The focus of the committee will be to establish baselines, measures of effectiveness, on-going analysis and recommendations for improving student success for students at Oxnard College. This committee directly supports Item No(s) 4 and 5 under 10+1.

Membership

The Student Success Committee will consist of the following: President (co-chair), Academic Senate President designee (co-chair), representatives from each department, Dean of Student Services, representatives from Categorical Programs and General Counseling areas, a representative from the Academic Support area, a representative from Instructional Technology, Classified Senate President or designee, Associated Student Government representative, a representative from the Transitional Studies Committee, Managerial co-chair of the Transitional Studies Committee, a representative from Matriculation, a representative from Instructional Support Services and Grant Directors (ex-officio). The Student Success Committee is open to all constituents and/or divisions/departments of the College.

Goals

- To provide collaborative venue for shared leadership determining the student access and success needs of the College to promote overall student learning and success
- Provide opportunities for constituents across the College from instructional, student services, and academic support areas to engage in ongoing dialogue on student success issues
- Promote a better understanding of the use of data and research in assessing student success and developing/refining College programs and activities to better support student success
- Provide advocacy for ongoing access to data and the use of data

DISCUSSION/DECISIONS

I.	Called to Order	I	The meeting was called to order at 2:06.
II.	What Have You Done for Student Success	I, D	Each committee member shared what they recently have done for student success on campus.
III.	Adoption of the Agenda		The Committee reviewed the agenda. L. Gonzalez asked for a motion to approve the agenda; I. Edwards motioned to approve; L. Mojica seconded and the agenda was unanimously approved.
IV.	Approval of Minutes	I, D	The Committee reviewed the minutes of the December 1, 2016 meeting. L. Gonzalez asked for a motion to approve the minutes: I. Edwards motioned to approve; R. Fontes seconded and the minutes were unanimously approved.
V.	Public Comments	I,D,A	J. Munyantwali discussed SOAR Week, and distributed a handout, "Oxnard College Presents, Senior Soar Week 2016", March 28 through April 4, 2016. J. Munyantwali discussed workshops that are held before students come to our campus and also follow-up meetings on Fridays when the matriculation process can be completed.

There was discussion on Financial Aid holding workshops on their process and also discussion on "prep to assess", which is being promoted at high schools. O. Cobian discussed "Go Days", a program modeled after Pierce Colleges Go Days. We can make sure students are ready for the first day of school. We will be making personal calls to all incoming students. Go Days are tentatively scheduled for the Monday and Tuesday of Flex Week, Fall 2016. The Committee discussed assessment, students understanding what classes to take to prepare for other classes (taking summer classes to prepare for fall classes). Also discussed was the personal one-on-one connection with students, testing and student's following through (bringing their transcripts to Counseling). Counseling advises students to go to Counseling right after their testing. If students test low, this is a good time to catch them. There was discussion on creating a check list for students. O. Cobian stated that this will be created and sent to the Committee Members. The Committee also discussed the appropriate level courses for incoming students. VI. Discussion on Institution-I, D C. Herrera distributed a handout, "Enrollment Trends and set Standards & Stretch Description of Student Population", a draft for Goals Listed in Accreditation in addition to Appendix G. The Committee Accreditation Selfwent through the graphs and charts in the handout. **Evaluation Report** C. Herrera and L. Hopper have identified the following demographics for Oxnard College: 72% of students at Oxnard College are Hispanic. The largest age bracket is 20 to 24. There are more females (55%) than males (45%). For 2014/2015, the student population receiving financial aid increased to 74.9%. 75% of our students are coming from local cities, Oxnard, Port Hueneme and Camarillo. 90% of our students come from Ventura County.

The majority of OC's population comes from Channel Islands High School and Hueneme High School.

The misery index is higher in our local areas.

On enrollment patterns, we have more part time than full time students.

The student enrollment status trend is going upwards; a large portion is continuing students.

Education goals are high for transfer and AA degree.

Course Success - Classes are running at 68-73%.

Regarding remedial student success cohorts, good examples are ENG 68 and ENG 96.

A large population of our students have a grade point average of 2.0 and above. 41% and 42% of students are 3.0 and 4.0.

There was a significant increase from 2011 to 2014 in the total amount of CTE certificates.

There has been a large jump in student transfer rates and degrees, about 79%.

Also discussed while going over the graphs and charts was the job market and employment growth in Ventura County, employment by sector, average pay, high demand job and hourly wages, and also developing student's abilities.

C. Herrera distributed a second handout, "Student Performance and Achievement Measures, Accreditation Appendix G", was created for accreditation. This form should be reviewed quarterly. C. Herrera asked for additions and acceptance of its contents. There was discussion on the math's, remedial and Basic Skills, M. Bates sabbatical information, and also performance indicators and outcomes. There was discussion on removing line item number 9, "Basic Skills MATH Progression". The Committee recommended removing this data element and maintaining the tracking using Scorecard Data for ESL, English and Math.

C. Herrera asked for a motion to remove line item number 9. M. Dean motioned, L. Ruvalaba seconded and the motion was passed.

			C. Herrera asked for a motion to accept the "Student Performance and Achievement Measures" as amended. L. Zsarnay motioned, M. Dean seconded and the motion was passed.
			J. Limbaugh shared the importance of the meeting minutes being specific, showing the process, and that there needs to be connections, the data needs to show why. He advised that the Committee should go through a certain number of line items on the "Students Performance and Achievement Measures" sheet at each of the remaining meetings of this year with a goal of setting standards and stretch goals for each data element.
			C. Herrera asked for a motion to have the Committee look at the line items during the remainder of the Student Success Committee meetings for this year, 2015-2016. J. Limbaugh motioned, A. Rodriguez seconded and the motion passed.
			C. Herrera distributed a third handout, "Institutional Effectiveness Model". She will be meeting with the Deans and Managers to discuss IE system, findings, elicit feedback, and the program review process.
VII.	Student Equity Plan Updates	I, D	L. Gonzalez reported that the SEP expense report is due in two weeks. It will be sent to the District and they will send it to the state. We have begun spending the 2015-2016 money.
VIII.	Student Success & Support Plan Updates	I, D	O. Cobian stated that there will be 4 counselors hired. One is for the VC Innovates Grant, the other three are general counseling.
IX.	Transitional Studies Committee Update	I, D	L. Gonzalez stated that the book loan program began the week of January 25, 2016. The books were ordered through our bookstore. We have received positive feedback from faculty on this program.
			J. Limbaugh stated that there will be a State Budget meeting here at Oxnard College, regarding the Basic Skills Initiative, on February 5, 2016, in LA-6 at 10:00. L. Gonzalez and M. Dean will be speaking about our current programs and about why we need the grant. There was discussion on what to explain to J. Irwin and
