Course Content

Lecture/Course Content

- 1. Craft techniques in different genres, including at a minimum fiction and poetry.
 - a. Craft techniques of poetry include sensory detail, imagery, metaphor, simile, rhythm, personification, symbolism, alliteration, persona, rhyme, tone, and form.
 - b. Craft techniques of fiction include plot, characterization, setting, point of view, tone, theme, dialogue, symbolism, foreshadowing, and style.
- 2. Various methods of reviewing student work.
 - Methods of reviewing student work include: in-class workshops, verbal feedback, and written feedback.
- 3. Production and revision of creative writing.
 - a. Students will produce an original manuscript comprised of at least five poems and one work of fiction. Each piece in the manuscript will have been drafted, workshopped and revised.
- 4. Reading, discussion, and analysis of literary models.
 - a. Students will read, discuss and analyze literary models written by professional writers.
 - b. Students will read, discuss and analyze literary models written by student writers.

Students will evaluate and critique original, student-generated works as well as professional creative works.
