This course reviews two genres of creative writing: poetry and fiction. Literature from each genre is analyzed critically, and students' original works are critiqued in workshop settings and at individual instructor conferences. At the end of the semester, students will have produced a substantial body of work in a specific genre - a few chapters of a novel, several short stories, or a chapbook of poetry.

Course Content**Lecture/Course Content**

1. Craft techniques in different genres, including at a minimum fiction and poetry.
 - a. Craft techniques of poetry include sensory detail, imagery, metaphor, simile, rhythm, personification, symbolism, alliteration, persona, rhyme, tone, and form.
 - b. Craft techniques of fiction include plot, characterization, setting, point of view, tone, theme, dialogue, symbolism, foreshadowing, and style.
2. Various methods of reviewing student work.
 - a. Methods of reviewing student work include: in-class workshops, verbal feedback, and written feedback.
3. Production, revision and presentation of creative writing.
 - a. Students will produce an original manuscript of either a short chap book of at least ten poems or four works of fiction, either four chapters for a story or four short stories. Each piece in the manuscript will have been drafted, workshoped and revised.
 - b. Students will participate in creating an online literary journal.
 - c. Students will learn how to read their creative work in public.
4. Reading, discussion, and analysis of literary models.
 - a. Students will read, discuss and analyze literary models written by professional writers.
 - b. Students will read, discuss and analyze literary models written by student writers.
